CLUB HISTORY

At the completion of the 2023/24 season Ormond Cricket Club has played in over 1000 games in the Victorian Sub District Cricket Association (VSDCA) and is in its 115th year as a cricket club.

Formed in 1903 Ormond's first three matches were played against Caulfield Grammar, Melbourne Sports Depot and Prahran Bohemians. The first captain was F A Looker and the initial president was most likely E Burman and the first season was played in the Brighton Moorabbin CA which soon merged to become the Brighton and District Cricket Association.



In total the club has won 29 senior premierships and 35 junior flags, overall 64. The first premiership was in 1908/09 when a new Christ Church minister C H Raymond who was completing his training arrived and went on to make 3 centuries in that season including 144 in the Grand Final. Just as importantly it was said his cricketing prowess improved church attendances.

Hard times fell on the club in 1912 when the lack of players and a ground meant the club disbanded early in the season. With WW1 imminent the club was like many others, not in a position to reform.

Immediately after the war, in 1919 Ormond was back playing in the Brighton and District CA. Three important events occurred in the next decade. Following a community petition for a recreational ground in 1921, plans were drawn up in 1923 for Ormond Park and Ormond CC was playing there by the mid twenties. Within a year or two the cricket club made representation to Caulfield Council for a pavilion and this was accepted as the club took responsibility for its construction. Ormond joined the Frankston Glenhuntly CA during this period and a new club soon to become fierce rivals, Ormond Park CC emanating from the Uniting Church emerged to play on the adjoining ground.

At the beginning of the 1930s Ormond again moved competitions as it joined the Caulfield and Districts CA where its senior teams played for the next 17 years. The club enjoyed premiership success during the WW2 period. A famous name appeared among the playing list in the early thirties, Ernest Gunn who by the end of the decade was already a leading club figure and for the following twenty five years lead the club as president until his retirement in 1970. Gunn also played a leading role with the Ormond Football Club and was a two term Caulfield Council mayor and in 1964 Ormond Park was renamed E E Gunn Reserve in recognition of his contribution.

It was Gunn who along with other key figures who recognised that Ormond and Ormond Park should not be diluting the local cricketing talent and with the introduction of turf cricket a possibility merging the clubs would benefit all parties. The name would remain Ormond CC, Gunn would be the new president and the new entity would take the blue and gold colours of Ormond Park.

Ormond enjoyed immediate success in the Victorian Junior Cricket Association (now VTCA) winning two 1st eleven premierships in 1947/48 and 1948/49. In 1949 the club joined the VSDCA where it has played for the next 71 years. Gradually, as more turf wickets were laid at Gunn Reserve all senior sides moved from the CDCA to play in VSDCA and VJCA turf competitions. After initial struggles, two VSDCA premierships were secured in the late fifties before the club's golden decade when it won six Championships from 1965/66 until 1974/75 with club legends Colin Hyland, John Craig and Ted Plant a part of all six victories (also Mike Patterson And Alan Doble who both played in five). Not unsurprisingly the club had a very strong junior platform and secured many junior successes during this time.

There have been lean periods and it was 40 years before the club's latest 1st XI premiership was won in 2014/15. For a period in the 1980s junior teams diminished to an alarmingly low level and little club success followed. Currently, Ormond CC is enjoying a strong period of growth with the first XI team appearing in finals for 7 of the past 10 seasons and the junior program servicing more than a dozen teams along with pre competition development.


ORMOND, VSDCA LEGEND honoured with OAM after decades of service to cricket.

A champion bat turned devoted official, John Craig's name appeared in the 2024 King's Birthday honours list. Yet he still went and did what he's done every Friday for the last 30 years during cricket season, he drove from his home in Hampton East to EE Gunn Reserve in Ormond and rolled the wicket for two hours.

As he did, his phone chirped with calls and messages of congratulations for his OAM for service to cricket. Two days later, John was back at The Gunn to watch the grand final of the Victorian Sub-District Cricket Association Under 15 representative carnival. The competition is named after him — The J G Craig Shield.

For many years, it was called the R M Hatch Shield but now it's the J G Craig Shield. As John kept a keen eye on play from the Ormond social club, a fellow approached and shook his hand. "Sir John!" he hooted. "Do we have to bow before you now?"

The OAM made official what many people in Subbies have thought for a long time: John Craig deserves a medal for what he's done for Ormond Cricket Club, the VSDCA and cricket in general. He was a great player for the Monders at a time when they dominated Sub-District cricket. The club's great era had players like Col Hyland, Mike Patterson, Alan Doble and little Teddy Plant behind the stumps. And there was John Craig, who started in the

middle-order for those supreme sides and finished as an opener (he jokes that he got so sick of going in at two-wickets-for-nothing that he figured he might as well open the batting).

When he finally retired from the First XI, he had made 8,963 runs – the third-most in Subbies and all of them on uncovered wickets – and played in eight group premierships and six championships. For years, his was the wicket opposition bowlers coveted.

"You always wanted to see the back of J Craig," former Caulfield star and Subbies stalwart Jack Sheehan says. "Very difficult to get him out and when you did, you knew you'd done something valuable for your team. He was the gun who played at The Gunn."

Incredibly, John's off-field contribution to Ormond Cricket Club has been just as significant where he has been on the committee since 1967. He was president from 1992-2006, did three years as treasurer, was club delegate to the VSDCA, coached junior teams and has acted as club patron since 2006. And of course, he has rolled the wicket, first with a hand-guided roller, now with a ride-on with power steering which is far better for an 81-year-old man with a cranky, creaky back.

At VSDCA level, he was chair from 2001-08, vice-president from 1994-2011, on the executive committee from 1974-2008 and chairman of selectors for 16 years. He's a life member of Ormond and of the VSDCA, and a Hall-of-Fame member and official legend of the Subbies. Cricket Victoria also gave him "life".

As the VSDCA was putting together its submission to Cricket Victoria, executive member Geoff Richardson made a

comment that set heads nodding. "Geez," he said, looking over Craig's long list of achievements. "If 'Craigy' can't get in, we might as well stop putting people up!"

What else is there?

Much more, but most notably he received an Australian Sports Medal in 2000 and a Cricket Australia 50 years of Service award in 2005. Now comes the OAM. John says, "I've had so many people say to me, 'It's a great honour and it's well deserved'. There have been so many comments to that effect that they can't all be untrue."

He was just as happy for Ormond as he was for himself. He says it's a great club and he's always happy to see it presented in a good light. Craig's association with it goes back to 1959, after he had finished school at Scotch College and turned up to use the skills he had honed in the backyard of the family home in North Rd. His parents followed him to the club. In time, John Snr and Beryl Craig were given life membership, as was his sister, Lyn, and her husband Mike Patterson.

Young John started in the fourths. A year later he was in the firsts. He stayed there until 1988/89, along the way winning six batting awards, serving as captain for five years (including the 1974/75 premiership team) and representing the VSDCA six times.

Craig had a technique transported from a coaching manual and teammates described him as a patient player with all the shots. They could

count on him when the going was tough and the stakes high, as when he hit 119 in the group final against Balwyn in 1966/67.

He had been an accomplished footballer for Ormond too, winning the club and VAFA Under 19 best and fairest medals in 1961. Craig also represented the amateurs, but a shoulder injury cut his football short.

After the glory years of the 1960s and 70s, it was a struggle for the Monders. For a while, they had no juniors. Craig brought them back when he became president in the 1990s. Now, the under-age section of the club is very strong. In fact, they have won multiple A grade premierships in the Under 12, 14 and 16 sections of the SECA competition in recent years.

"The First XI at the moment has nine players who have come through the juniors," Craig says. He's always encouraged young cricketers.

Former Club President and stalwart Brian Ambler remarked, "I can remember playing my first year as an 11-year-old – I'm 69 now – and 'Craigy' was coach of the Under 14s. In those days, we had mats that would go down on a concrete slab and 'Craigy' would drive around with two big mats hanging out the back of his Cortina, as well as six to eight kids. "Couldn't get away with that these days!"

Ambler says it's amazing to think that Craig is still putting in at Ormond almost 60 years later. "You can talk about him in decades, not years," he says.

"His commitment is extraordinary. He's a legend of Ormond, a legend of Sub-District cricket and a legend of Victorian cricket."

Congratulations John.



SECRETARY'S REPORT 2023/24

To the Members, Players and Supporters of the Ormond Cricket Club

I submit for your approval at the 77th Annual General Meeting of the Ormond Cricket Club, the Annual Report and Statement of Income and Expenditure for season 2023-2024.

Well, as they say, what a season it was!

As we approached season 2023-2024, the club saw a completely revamped 1st XI, with a squad of around 12 players all born and bred Ormond juniors returning to the club to led by another born and bred Ormond junior in coach Sam Kindlen.

The club welcomed back Tom Cameron, Bailey Moon, and Miles Sellenger to join Zac Sleeman and Rory Freeman, completing their playing and coaching stints at Premier Cricket clubs, junior state representative cricket, some even making the Cricket Australia Under 19 side. They we joined by UK players, Josh Hickman, Charlie Ogrizovic, Caleb Futter, George Gompertz, Andrew Williams, and Anooj Mehta, along with Jackson Hall from Altona Cricket Club, Declan Waddington from Tasmanian Premier Cricket Club Lindisfarne via Ivanhoe Cricket Club and finally Navdeep Singh from Caulfield South Cricket Club.

Fast forward and for the first time since season 1966-1967, the club had all four senior sides competing in the finals. What made it even more amazing was that we played Elsternwick in week one in all four grades.

The 1sts making their third grand final appearance in four seasons, the 3rds making the finals since season 2020-2021, and playing in their first grand final since the introduction of the VSDCA 3rds & 4ths competition in season 1996-1997, the 2nds returning to the finals since season 2020-2021 and the 4ths attempting to go one better from last season.

These results meant the club finished in 7th place in the VSDCA Club Championship Award, which is the highest position the club has reached since its introduction in season 2000-2001. Even more important was that of the 46 players that played in the finals around 30 of those players came through the Ormond junior program.

The 1st XI led by Tom Cameron, well supported by the ever-reliable Tom Buchanan as his vice-captain had a great start to the season with 3 wins from 3 against Oakleigh, Moorabbin, and Croydon, before 3 losses in a row against Noble Park, Balwyn, and Port Melbourne. From there the 1sts kicked into overdrive by winning 7 of the next 9 games, including an outright win in the penultimate round against Malvern and going into the finals in 5th position. In the qualifying final we beat Elsternwick for the 2nd week in a row and therefore eliminated them from the finals before a very nervous semi-final win against Mount Waverley, before the grand final showdown against Noble Park, where after winning the toss and bowling we were unable to chase down 175 set by Noble Park falling 43 runs short.

The 2nd XI led by coach Sam Kindlen, who took over mid-season from the ever-reliable Will Robertshaw had a disastrous start of 4 losses against Oakleigh, Moorabbin, Croydon, and Noble Park, before winning 9 of the next 11 games, including the last round win against Elsternwick to earn their spot in the finals and finishing in 6th position. The qualifying final was a repeat of the 1sts, beating but not eliminating Elsternwick before a semi-final showdown with rival Caulfield, where after losing the toss and bowling we made a heroic effort of chasing down 271, but fell short by 35 runs.

The 3rd XI led by Matt Dutton, moving up after captaining the 4ths last season also had a rough start of 3 losses against Port Melbourne, Box Hill, and Malvern before winning 9 of the next 11 games and going into the finals in 3rd position. They too also faced Elsternwick in the semi-final, where after losing the toss and bowling, were in deep trouble at 9/198, chasing 219, before the pairing of Nick Riley and Jeff Plumb put on 22 for the last wicket and got us home. That set up a Grand Final meeting with rivals Malvern, where after restricting them to 189, we were unable to repeat the semi-final heroics falling 38 runs short.

The 4th XI led by another new member to the club in Phil Mellas, saw our young Monders have 7 wins from 13 games and secured the quinella by beating Donvale in the last round by finishing in 4th position. Unfortunately, in the semi-final the young Monders were defeated by a very experienced Elsternwick team.

The Sunday Team led this season by Hitesh Sojitra and playing in the Cricket Southern Bayside (CSB) Sunday One Day competition in Division 1, were unable to make finals and frustratingly finished in 5th position, missing finals by percentage of 0.69% with 7 wins.

The JG Craig Under 15 representative side, once again another talented and successful team were led by Coaches Miles Sellenger and Michael Cove. The boys finished top of the South Group with 4 wins from 5 games and two washouts. Unfortunately, the lads met their nemesis Croydon again in the qualifying final, this time playing them at home but were unable to avenge last year's result, this time falling short by 36 runs.

In the junior section, the club fielded 10 teams this season in the South East Cricket Association (SECA) competition, with 4 Under 12 teams, plus an Under 12 Rookies team, 3 Under 14 teams, and 2 Under 16 teams. All, teams were again extremely competitive with the Under 12A side making the semi-finals, the Under 14A side winning the Grand Final against rivals Brighton, the Under 14B side making the semi-finals, the Under 14C side making the Grand Final and finishing runners up to South Melbourne Districts and the U16A side making the semi-finals.

In October, the club held the latest edition of the Hall of Fame & Life Members Function, where the club inducted two new Life Members being Rob Everett and Stephen Haddy, along with Andrew Chisholm who received his award after being unable to attend last year's presentation. All would agree those inducted are worthy recipients and have made significant contributors to the history of the club. The function was a success with a great turnout of family members for those honoured as well as a host of current, past, and recently past players in attendance.

Also at the function, the club celebrated its 1000th senior 1st XI game in the VSDCA, which according to club historian Geoff Cowen occurred in the Round 9 game against Bayswater. As a result, the club commissioned a special playing shirt for all senior teams with 1000 games and the date on them. The club would again like to thank its sponsor Craig Allen from Craig Allen & Associates for his generous support in sponsoring the 1000th game playing shirts.

During this year's Australia Day honors list, the club had the pleasure to announce that our Club Patron John Craig was awarded the medal of the order of Australia (OAM) for his services to the Ormond Cricket Club, the VSDCA and Cricket Victoria. On behalf of everyone involved with the club, we congratulate Craigy on this award and for what he has done for the club and cricket in general. Craigy has again had to deal with some health issues, so his dedication is much appreciated.

In early February, the club received news of the sad passing of Lesley Plant, wife of club legend Ted Plant. Lesley was just as much a club legend as Ted, some would say even more. On behalf of everyone involved with the club our condolences again to Kylie, Craig, Greg, and families as well as Kylie's husband former Ormond & Mount Waverley Cricket Club member Darren Carter. Fittingly Lesley's passing occurred the night before Ormond and Mount Waverley 1sts and 2nds, were due to play the re-scheduled Round 7 game for the Ted Plant Shield, with Darren & Kylie's son Lachlan playing in the 2nds for Mount Waverley.

I would now like to thank those who were responsible for making season 2023-2024 happen:

- Our Coach, Sam Kindlen. Thanks, Sam for coming home and having a fantastic first season, where your ideas, enthusiasm, and your attitude to making cricket fun as well as developing the playing group to achieve its full potential, has already been achieved in year one. I am looking forward to seeing what you have planned for next season.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2023/24

Dear Members and Supporters,

COVID certainly changed community sport and the club was still feeling the effects over the past 2 seasons where we recorded significant financial



losses. Sponsorship from local businesses who were locked down during the pandemic dried up and fund raising in general became more challenging. The COVID years also saw registrations drop in our Blasters and junior teams which negatively impacted on our membership revenue.

Given the above facts, I returned to the role as President in 2023/24 to address the financial situation by generating more revenue and restoring the club's financial reserves.

There are two distinct aspects of running a club, on-field and off field that I will address in this report.

OFF FIELD

Let me start by saying the club's off field management is run by a proactive committee. All key decisions this season were made by consultation with committee members and I would personally like to thank the group for their contribution and dedication to making the club even stronger.



Special thanks to former President Brian Ambler who took the reins in my absence due to family health issues and he travelled up from Point Lonsdale numerous

times to attend meetings, run functions and work at numerous BBQ's. I would also like to single out Darren Seymour who managed more than a dozen Bunnings BBQ's on behalf of the club where we cooked more than 8,000 sausages that generated a profit of more than \$20,000. Without this revenue the club's financial position would look very different.

Long standing members Mat Cousins (Secretary) and Liam Mulcahy (Treasurer) both play extremely important roles while Tanja Curtis manages our Blasters programme and ensures our juniors are front and centre in all strategic decisions. Club legend John Craig never stops working behind the scenes on the roller, scoreboard, bar or game day administration.

The club relies heavily on the financial support of sponsors together with membership subscriptions and fund raising activities. We are fortunate to have some major sponsors including Bendigo Bank (Murrumbeena Branch), The Door Store, Buxtons Real Estate, The Bentleigh Social, Craig Allen & Associates and Cricket HQ who have been loyal supporters for a number of years. We aim to add more value to our sponsor packages next year and the search for new sponsors never stops.

As you'll read in the Treasurer's Report, we recorded a significant profit this season primarily on the back of the Bunnings BBQ's that has almost restored the losses of the past two seasons. It was a great result but we can't afford to be complacent with rising costs and some extraordinary expenses due in the 2024/25 season including our share of the scoreboard upgrade. With growing cost of living pressures, we are also looking at how to deliver more benefits to our club members with some innovative ideas and we also plan to reintroduce afternoon teas for the players. To fund the initiatives we have committed to running multiple Bunnings BBQ's again next season.

Failing to plan is planning to fail and this year with the help of Brendan Barry we updated our strategic plan for the next 3 years.

In summary, after several very difficult years, the club is back in a solid financial position with significant cash reserves, a strong balance sheet and an incredible junior program. We have a squad of senior players that are capable of playing finals across all grades again next season.

ON FIELD

In the off season we lost a number of very experienced players so expectations weren't high leading into the preseason period. However, the return of three 21 year old highly talented ex-juniors raised our hopes and making finals was seen as achievable if everything fell into place. These three players - Zac Sleeman, Miles Sellenger and Bailey Moon had all represented Victoria at under age levels and played Premier first XI cricket in the last few seasons.

We certainly exceeded expectations under new coach Sam Kindlen with all four senior teams playing finals for the first time since 1962. Sam was a 'home grown' Ormond junior and senior player who had coaching roles at a Premier Club (Richmond) and a VSDCA club (Brighton). Sam's role in our on-field success this season cannot be understated and both our 1st XI and 3rd XI finished runners up. Not only that, Sam took on the captaincy of the second XI mid-season and after a poor start, he guided that team into finals. Most importantly, he pushed a positive brand of cricket across all grades and a spirit of cricket that won the club respect from other clubs, umpires and the VSDCA. Thank you Sam for your planning, dedication and leadership.

The 1st XI played Noble Park in the grand final and unfortunately fell 43 runs short which means we have finished runners up in 3 of the past 4 seasons. Significantly, the team contained 9 former Ormond juniors which is something we are very proud of and further proof our junior program is as good as any club in the state. Underpinning our senior squad is a pipeline of talented juniors that continue to transition into our senior sides. This is a credit to all our junior coaches starting with the Blasters Programme and most of these junior coaches are senior players who are 'giving back' to the club.

The first XI finished 5th on the ladder and actually had to win the final 2 games to guarantee a finals berth so to beat Mt Waverley and Elsternwick in the finals was outstanding. Having said that, the Club is obviously more than just the 1st XI and once again we provided a broad range of opportunities for those in our community, ranging in ages from single figures to mid 50's. Next year we plan to expand and launch a ladies team plus reintroduce a senior 5th XI.

Our 3rd XI also made the grand final under the leadership of Matt Dutton and he has been another reason why our club has got stronger in recent years. The development of the younger players in the lower grades has made the transition to higher grades almost seamless with players like Kane Gleeson and Tom Merry stepping up and making an impact at the higher levels. Phil Mellas who captained our 4th XI this year should also be mentioned in the same conversation.

Special mention must be given to former president Will Robertshaw who has coached many of the juniors and the current junior coaches. He continues to mentor players moving up into the seniors and his energy and passion for the club is unrivalled. He also plays a key role off field managing player recruitment and he could also be described as our 'player welfare officer' and 'marketing manager'.

The final point regarding on field was an incident at E E Gunn Reserve where a Croydon first XI player had a heart attack during the warm-up. Fortunately, the combination of a young medical student walking by the ground who applied CPR, the fire brigade and the club's defibrillator produced a positive outcome.

JUNIORS

In the past we relied on our juniors to fill senior teams in the thirds and fourths, however, juniors now have to earn their place in these teams. They say 'success breeds success' and our growing player numbers mean we will reintroduce a senior 5th XI team next year. Giving our talented junior players experience on turf wickets is a great model and our investment in the juniors over the past decade has set up for a period of sustained on-field success.

Our 14A grade team won the premiership while our Under 12A and 16A teams both made finals. Our Under 15 J G Craig team made finals for the 7th consecutive year and we have seen a number of juniors make Victorian under-age

squads in the past few years. To Miles Sellenger and Mick Cove who collectively have coached our Craig team for the past decade, a massive thank you. A large part of the club's resurgence is attributable to graduates of our Craig teams joining the club as senior players.

Congratulations to all the junior players who played representative cricket this year and special mention to Tom Scott who took out the prestigious Steve Ambler Memorial Award.

The Club would not be the same without everyone who participated in or helped out with our junior cricket program. Our junior coordinator, team managers, scorers, coaches and those who simply turn up each weekend to watch and support the children are instrumental in making the Club (and cricket generally) what it is. We live in an amazing community of people and the Club thanks all of you for your contribution and support.

The Club is already planning for the 2024/25 season and we look forward to making it a success on and off the field.



- Nick Oaten 5/40 v Moorabbin Round 2



Finishing the season as runners up in this competition was a fine achievement for all involved with this team throughout the season, only missing out on the coveted flag by coming up against a strong Malvern Team who played the whole season without losing a single game. We pushed them extremely hard over the two days but unfortunately found Malvern too strong across all facets in losing to the better team.

The journey began back in October with the loss of the first 3 matches of the season, of which 2 were evenly contested and could have gone either way on the day. However, this team grew in confidence following a hard-fought win in Round 4 to Noble Park, to then return a record of 9 wins, 1 further loss and 1 abandonment from that point in the regular season. Whether with bat, ball or in the field this group continued to show character, resilience and a 'Team' ethic that made this season so rewarding.

Key batting contributions over the season were:

- **Dion Kromlidis**: 308 runs @ 20.53, including an innings of real character in the GF where he made 50 opening the batting.
- Cam Ferstl: 295 runs @ 24.58, including two 'game defining' 50+ scores in difficult circumstances.
- Harish Salwathura: 273 runs @ 27.3, a young player who will continue to thrive as a top order player.
- Charlie Ogrizovic: 197 runs @ 32.83, this included a 62 in the semi final as the backbone to our run chase.

Other batters to note were **Tom Merry** whose 197 runs at 49.25 during the early part of the season propelled him into 2nd XI cricket, **Brendan Plumb's** 210 runs at 30.0 laid the foundation to several games around his school commitments, **Sam Dutton's** 66 on a difficult wicket away at Box Hill was crucial in securing a win first game after Xmas, **Jeff Plumb's** 'heroic' 46no in the semi final to win the game with Nick Riley in our 10th wicket partnership was a reflection of his value to this team (not forgetting the 40 in similar circumstances against Box Hill) and finally the three 50+ scores from **Matt Dutton** in a couple of valued partnerships along the journey.

The key bowling contributions were:

- **Nick Riley**: 22 wickets @ 19.41, often bowling the 'hard overs' Nick was arguably the most consistent bowler in this team throughout the season.
- **Varun Rao**: 20 wickets @ 10:45, took key wickets at key times in every game played. Like Nick, has a huge work ethic and gives his all for the team.
- **Noah Spitz**: 18 wickets @ 8.56, including 5-44 in the GF which was one of the best spells of quick bowling seen during the entire season. A consistent threat in every game played.

Other bowlers to note were **Lachy Collopy** whose 11 wickets were taken in breaking key partnerships at valuable times over the season (a great team man and outstanding fielder), **Dylan Vesel** took 10 wickets @ 22.7 in becoming a key, consistent member of our bowling attack as the season progressed and another great team player and **Harish Salwathura**'s 9 wickets of wrist spin provided the balance our attack needed and another key contributor during the



FOURTH XI REPORT 2023/24

Another strength of the team was the boy's willingness to back themselves in and play aggressive and attacking cricket. There is a lot to look forward to with respect to our junior development and talent transitioning through into our senior teams over the coming years. While we were never about individualising, it is incumbent on me to briefly mention what Monders have to look forward to as these juniors make a positive impact on our senior teams in the seasons ahead.

- Aidan Jobling Won the batting average for the season and was instrumental in setting up the many big innings across the season. Scored heavily across a number of innings and was a tremendous anchor throughout. Those that know Aidan are aware that he is a bowler who was in our team as he was unable to bowl for the majority of the season due to circumstances.
- Leith Salwathura Opened the batting with Aiden and was likewise a significant reason for our strong starts. Was part of many significant partnerships along with Aiden and others and contributed strongly across the season with his bowling as well. A thirst for learning will keep him in good stead in the years to come.
- **Peter O'Malley** Peter is a talented cricketer who is a brilliant fieldsman and a batsman who takes the game on. A positive and attacking approach to the game and a strong competitor, he has the ability to quickly take the game away from the opposition.
- Shlock Shanbhag Won the bowling average for the season and this was well deserved through his ability to
 take wickets consistently, break important partnerships, and take quality scalps along the way. His leg spin
 bowling belied his age and he continued to confuse batsmen across the season. Adding to this was his
 contribution with the bat where he featured in significant partnerships, and individual performances.
- Leo Gelfand Leo's glove work has been superb across the season, taking brilliant catches and showing grit and consistency across long innings. He is also a talented batsman who played a variety of roles for the team across the season. He has the ability to play the aggressor and buckle down as required and was the backbone of our semifinal innings.
- Kaevish Bhasin Like Aidan and Leith, Kaevish played a key role at the top of the order also opening the batting
 at times and contributing to significant partnerships with his attacking batting. Alongside Shlock, he has also

 forward to seeing his bowling continue to develop and he is also capable with the bat in hand.

While I have highlighted the juniors, I also want to thank the following senior players for their outstanding contribution during the season:

- Kuldeep Sidhu who opened our bowling with his right arm inswing and consistently took early wickets, getting us
 off to strong starts in many matches. His batting became a weapon late in the innings where he showed an ability to quickly add runs.
- James Dutton who was an integral part of our spin attack and made significant contributions to breaking partnerships and some key innings with the bat.
- Andy Williams who joined us from the UK during the season and bowled with pace and fire while also teaming
 up with Kuldeep for some great tail wagging.
- George Gompertz, also from the UK joined Ormond and while only playing a handful of games, made significant contributions as a class batsman and is a talented cricketer.
- Leigh Jobling played a small number of games after coming back from injury and provided great pace to our blowing attack and was a valuable contributor.
- Asher Dunne played the early part of the season and was a key part of our middle order brining attacking flare
 while also being a brilliant fieldsman. We didn't get to see enough of Asher and he is a talented cricketer with
 great upside.



JUNIOR SECTION REPORT 2023/24

Juniors are the foundation of the club's future.

This season the club again invested heavily in the development of junior players and the model of paying junior coaches (rather than relying on parents as coaches) provides us with a clear point of difference compared to other clubs. They say, 'the proof is in the pudding' and our senior First XI finished runners up this season with a team that contained 9 former Ormond juniors. This is an incredible achievement and a reward for a decade of hard work by a range of coaches.

Our 3 other senior teams also played finals and they were full of home grown current and past juniors. The club's 2015 strategic plan was to become a destination club for talented junior cricketers and our Under 15 Craig Programme continues to attract high end juniors. The program delivers a great experience and serves as an excellent recruitment tool plus prepares young players for senior cricket. Special thanks to Miles Sellenger who coached the Craig team for the past two seasons and his assistants Will Scott and Michael Cove.

We are very proud of our success in the juniors but there's no room for complacency. The challenge is to maintain the high standards and within SECA, Ormond is recognised as a destination club. We attract players from other clubs looking to develop their game and play A grade. Again in 2023/24 we had a number of juniors selected to play representative cricket for SECA and ISEC teams.



This season the majority of our junior teams played finals and engaging senior players to coach junior teams provides players with better technical foundations and also helps develop future senior players. Of course, it comes at a price and the committee should be congratulated for their vision and investment in the juniors.

This season the number of junior teams we fielded was reduced from 13 to 10 which is probably attributable to COVID years when participation numbers dropped in our feeder program, Woolworths Blasters. The 10 junior teams played in the South East Cricket Association (SECA) including 2 Under 16 teams, 3 Under 14 teams, 4 Under 12 teams and 1 Under 12 Rookie teams. In addition, we also fielded a representative team in the VSDCA Under 15 J G Craig competition.

We continue to run the grass roots Woolworths Blasters Programs on Saturday mornings that caters for our 5 to 8 year old emerging cricketers. Club vice-president Tanja Curtis manages this incredibly important part of the club and with the help of some senior players, our Blasters Program grew again this year.

Under 14A grade is now the pinnacle of junior cricket in the SECA region because the Under 16 competition is robbed of the most talented players at the back end of the season who are forced to play school (APS) cricket on Friday evenings. Our 14A grade team under the coaching of Lachie Collopy had a sensational win chasing down 185 in the grand final against the previously undefeated Brighton team. It's no surprise to know that a number of those Under 14A boys are already playing senior cricket at the club.

Success in junior sport can be measured a number of ways but participation should take priority over premierships. Having said that, apart from the 14A premiership team, our Under 12A grade team finished second on the ladder but lost the semi-final. Under the guidance of master coach, Phil Arnold, the Under 12A grade team were shooting for a 'threepeat' after winning back to back premierships the previous 2 seasons. Our Under 15 J G Craig team again went through the group stage undefeated but stumbled in the quarter final against eventual premiers, Croydon.

I would like to thank all our junior coaches and their team managers for their efforts this season in ensuring that the players were taught the skills of the game and most importantly, the spirit of the game. Our coaching group's key objectives were to teach, develop skills, build confidence and ensure the players build a love of the game and the club.

The healthy player numbers, particularly in our Under 12 and 14 ranks, provides a sense of optimism about what lies ahead. I look forward to the 2024/25 season and I'm expecting it to be full of challenges, progress and triumphs.


SEASON REPORT







gave the hosts some momentum with a solid score of 8/184 on the board. A highlight with the ball was Armaan Bharwada with 4/41.







TREASURER'S REPORT 2023/24



Following a loss of \$24,784 in the prior year, the Ormond Cricket Club is reporting a profit of \$26,087 for season 2023-24. Following the prior year's significant loss, steps were taken by the Committee to ensure the club operated within its means in addition to identifying new opportunities for raising funds.

It should be noted that both the current and prior year losses include a non-cash write-down in the value of equipment on hand of \$3,500 and \$3,749 respectively.

Total income increased from \$107,211 to \$118,309. The key drivers of this increase were from an increase in fundraising activities, predominantly due to the running of regular Bunnings BBQs throughout the season, and from additional donations made by members via the Australian Sports Foundation program. These increases were partially offset by a decrease in grants income and from a reduction in membership income due to having less junior and senior teams this season.

Overall, cricket club expenditure decreased in season 2023/24 by \$39,773. This reduction was substantially driven by a reduction in playing fees, and to a lesser extent due to the lower number of teams driving a reduction in equipment and merchandise costs. A further driver of the decrease in expenditure was due to the prior year including additional expenditure for leadership and development which was grant funded.

As a result of the improved financial performance over the season the Club has built up a more stable cash position and is looking ahead to continue to maintain this financial security.

Ormond Cricket Club enjoys a strong ongoing relationship with its sponsors, and the financial contributions of The Door Store, Bendigo Bank Murrumbeena, Buxton Real Estate, The Bentleigh Social and Craig Allen & Associates deserve to be highlighted. The Club also wishes to thank those very generous people and businesses who sponsored a player or made a donation via the ASF during the season.

I would like to acknowledge the support of John Craig and Mathew Cousins in administering the Club's financial matters, as well as thank Will Robertshaw and Darren Seymour for their hard work to drive the prompt payments from players for subscriptions, match fees and merchandise purchases.

Ormond Cricket Club will look forward to continuing its financial momentum in season 2024/25, capitalising on the hard work and discipline displayed in this past year following the prior two disappointing seasons.
