VALE MICHAEL PATTERSON

It is with great sadness that we pass on the news of the passing of Mike Patterson on October 28 following a long term illness. Mike was indisputably one of the great cricketers and clubman to represent Ormond Cricket Club and also had a fine football career with Ormond Amateur Football Club including assuming the role as the 1st XVIII captain.

Mike was a key member of the most successful period in the cricket club's entire history. From 1967/68 to 1974/75 Ormond won six overall Championships plus eight Group Premierships. Mike opened the batting in five of the six premierships. The only one he missed was the 1970/71 flag win over Port Melbourne, the date coinciding with his own wedding to Lyn Craig, John's sister. As well as becoming related by law, on many occasions Mike and John opened the batting for Ormond.



Mike played juniors with Ormond and was in the U16 junior premiership team before graduating to the 2nd XI the following season. Debuting in the 1st XI in 1960/61 Mike played 22 seasons in the firsts until 1981/82, the third most games for Ormond only behind John and Russell Oaten.

He was quite a dour batsman who truly valued his wicket. He made just under 6,000 1ST XI runs and ground down many a bowler with his patience and determination. His pet dislike was batsmen who threw away their wicket unnecessarily. He and fellow opener Tony Duggan still today hold the club's 1st wicket partnership record of 212 against Williamstown. He scored an unbeaten hundred not out against Mt Waverley and 58 half centuries. In a very successful side he twice claimed the 1st XI batting average in a team packed with stars. In the 1973/74 season, he was involved in seven fifty plus opening partnerships - how would we all like to have that consistency at the start of an innings! In that season he was selected in the VSDCA representative team.

But it was not just his batting. In the 1967/68 Championship win over Geelong Mike was awarded the player of the Grand Final, not only for his batting, but also for his 5 catches predominantly taken at first slip, a season where he took 9 catches. In another match he took 6 catches against Malvern. This was an outstanding effort considering he did face eye issues for a significant time in his playing career. Probably the hidden gem of his playing career was his bowling hat trick taken against Brunswick!

But it was not just his individual performances. Mike was critical for the team's morale. For those readers old enough, batting was hard enough confronting the likes of Alan Doble, Ross Chapman and Co without the constant loud but fair chirping from Mike and wicket keeper Ted Plant. Despite the noise, Mike upheld the manner in which cricket should be played, something, that he was immensely proud of.

One other aspect that he was proud of was that his two sons Brad and Cameron both played for a significant time in the 1st XI for Ormond. Brad was a patient opening bat in the mould of his father and the younger Cameron as an all-rounder who batted and bowled with a little more flair.

Mike was also very involved off the field. He acted as chairman of selectors for many seasons, was a VSDCA delegate and the club's Social Secretary. Being married to Lyn, with brother-in-law John, mother-in-law Beryl plus her husband John (snr) the 1st XI scorer, perhaps Mike had little option but to fully embrace life with Ormond.

Above all, Mike was very principled in the way he approached and lived his life. His impact on the cricket club and those he played in teams with was immense. He was deservedly inducted into the club's initial Hall of Fame in 2017. His failing health in the last few years meant that he did not visit the Gunn as often as he would have liked and his last public cricket appearance was earlier in the year supporting the Craig team in its finals encounter.

All associated with Ormond extend our deepest sympathies to Lyn, daughter Lisa, sons Brad and Cameron and their families along with brother-in-law John Craig.

SECRETARY'S REPORT 2024/25

To the Members, Players and Supporters of the Ormond Cricket Club

I submit for your approval at the 78th Annual General Meeting of the Ormond Cricket Club, the Annual Report and Statement of Income and Expenditure for season 2024-2025.

After such a fantastic season 2023-2024, it was considered it could be difficult to replicate the same in season 2024-2025. Unfortunately for the club that was the case for season 2024-2025.

However, season 2024-2025 produced several key achievements and important milestones for the club. The inaugural season of the Ormond Cricket Club Women's team and the 4th XI Premiership win, the club's first Premiership since the introduction of the VSDCA 3rds and 4ths competition.

The club would like to congratulate and acknowledge the following members of the inaugural Ormond Cricket Club Women's team: Stephanie Alexiades, Bonnie Appleby, inaugural Captain Beth Beddoe, Lucy Clifford, Eliza Heard, Kiandra Hughes, Madeline McDougall, Hannah McKnight, Alannah McSwain, Annele Moon, Alina Neesham, Nicola Pike, Lucinda Reeh, Genevieve Reid and Subira Seymour.

A fantastic inaugural season, with the team improving round by round, resulting in finishing the season with 5 wins, in 7th position and only 1 and a half games out of competing in finals. A great achievement by the team, with a majority of the team playing competitive cricket for the first time.

The season commenced with a new President in Darren Seymour who took over due to Pat Camm deciding to step down before the start of the season and a new Coach with the appointment of experienced 1st XI player James Bartholomeusz taking over from Sam Kindlen.

The club lost the services of several experienced players in Tom Cameron, Tom Buchanan, Rory Freeman, Navdeep Singh, Marcus Allen and Josh Hickman, but gained several experienced UK players in Jamie Price, Sean Davies, Amaan Broughton, along with female player Eliza Heard, Jack Pascoe from Brighton Cricket Club and Clement Tommy from Vanuatu. The club also welcomed back former 1st XI Captain and Club Coach Michael Hansen who returned to play with his son Lucas in the 4th XI.

The 1st XI had a new captain in Nick Oaten who was well supported by vice-captain Zac Sleeman. After a slow start to the season, the 1st XI finished up with 6 wins and finished in 13th position and only 2 and a half games out of finals contention. Notable wins were Round 3 against Werribee, where the 1sts successfully defended 127, Rounds 8 & 9 against Spotswood and Williamstown, almost getting the outright against Melton in Round 13 and Round 15 against arch-rival Oakleigh.

The 2nd XI was led by James Robertshaw and unfortunately due to the loss of several experienced players as mentioned, the 2nds were made up of several of the club's promising junior players resulting in only 2 wins for the season and finishing in 14th position. The two wins for the 2nds came against Altona in Round 4 and Melton in Round 12, and were unlucky not to get three wins, due to a washout against Moorabbin in Round 5, where the 2nds posted 337.

The 3rd XI was led by Cam Ferstl and were looking to repeat last season's performance and go that one step better. The 3rds again qualified for finals but unfortunately were unable to go that one step better, due to a washout in the semi-final against Port Melbourne, which denied the 3rds of making it to the Grand Final. Another great season with 9 wins, finishing in 3rd position with notable wins in Rounds 1 and 11 against Donvale, Round 12 against Moorabbin and Round 15 against Box Hill.

The 4th XI was led again by Phil Mellas, who unfortunately had to step down early in the season due to injury and was ably replaced by Michael Hansen. A fantastic season for the 4ths, finishing on top of the ladder with 11 wins, which assisted them progressing through to the Grand Final, after a washout in the semi-final against Port

Melbourne and winning a fantastic Grand Final on the main ground against Noble Park. Notable wins for the 4ths were Round 4 against Endeavour Hills, where Michael Hansen made 102 not out of 49 balls chasing 118 and Round 12 against Moorabbin, where it was Michael Hansen again this time making 153 off 97 balls and batting at number 8.

The 5th XI was retained, but no longer as a stand-alone Sunday team and returned as an Ormond Development team in the SECA Senior Competition. The team competed in a Saturday One-day competition on synthetic wickets. Unfortunately for the team they had to forfeit three games during the season due to a shortage of numbers and finished with two wins in 9th position. However, several of our junior players gained valuable experience playing senior cricket, producing several individual performances, which will hopefully have them pushing for spots this coming season in the 3rds and 4ths.

The JG Craig Under 15 representative side once again had another talented team led by new Coach Josh Sugden. The boys finished with 4 wins from 6 games and 1 washout. Unfortunately, the lads missed out on qualifying for finals by just 0.40%

In the junior section, the club fielded 11 teams this season in the South East Cricket Association (SECA) competition, with 4 Under 12 teams, plus 2 Under 12 Rookies teams, 3 Under 14 teams, and 2 Under 16 teams. All, teams were again extremely competitive with the Under 12A side runners up in the Grand Final against Brighton, the Under 12B side winning the Grand Final against Brighton, Under 12C (1) runners up in the Grand Final against Parkdale, the Under 14A side winning the Grand Final against Brighton, the Under 14B side making the semi-finals, the Under 14C side making the semi-finals and the U16A side making the semi-finals.

COACH'S REPORT 2024/25

As we reflect on the 2024–25 season, it's important to acknowledge that this year has been one of transition and growth for Ormond Cricket Club. Our journey has been filled with challenges, triumphs, and moments of development that will serve as the foundation for our future. As head coach, it's been an honour to witness the determination and hard work displayed by our players, coaches, and volunteers. I'd like to take this opportunity to highlight the remarkable efforts of every person involved with the club.

Let's begin with the Fourth XI, a team that truly embodied the spirit and strength of Ormond Cricket Club this season.

This year, we witnessed something special. Michael Hansen not only returned as captain but led from the front to finish as the leading run-scorer in the entire competition. Right behind him, Leith Salwathura came in second, forming a formidable duo at the top of the order. On the bowling front, Kuldeep Singh delivered one of the best seasons of his career, claiming 25 wickets and securing second place in the league's bowling standings.

With such outstanding individual performances, it came as no surprise that the Fourth XI finished the home-and-away season on top of the ladder. They carried that form into finals and went on to secure a fantastic premiership, an achievement built on resilience, team unity, and some truly inspirational leadership.

I want to especially acknowledge Michael Hansen not only for his outstanding season with the bat and as captain but also to proudly announce that he will be stepping into the role of assistant coach for the upcoming season. His cricketing experience, leadership, and passion for the club will no doubt be an asset to our coaching group moving forward.

Turning to the Third XI. This group was a major focus for us this season, right alongside the Fourths. Our main objective was to ensure that players were being promoted based on readiness, not necessity. We wanted to give them the time and space to find form, build confidence, and understand their roles whether with bat or ball, before stepping up to higher levels. It was about more than just stats; it was about development.

One of the key things we worked on was helping players learn how to convert: turning starts into big scores, and wickets into consistent match-winning performances. That growth mentality came through clearly this year. We had four standout performers with the bat Shlok Shanbhag, Leo Gelfand, Leo Glenane, and Dion Kromlidis who all finished in the top 10 for batting across the entire league. That alone is a huge achievement. But what makes it even more impressive is that every one of them earned their way into the Second XI by season's end. That's not just a reflection of talent, but of progression, maturity, and work ethic.

For a long time, we've struggled with players being pushed up too soon, often before they were ready. This year, we took a different approach: we focused on development and rewarded performance. It wasn't about where you start the season, it was about where you finish. And those four boys are the perfect example of that process working exactly as we hoped.

On the bowling front, the Third XI was led by a tight and well-balanced attack. Nick Riley was the spearhead reliable, composed, and consistent as ever finishing fourth in the league for wickets. The team overall finished third on the ladder, and had it not been for an unfortunate bout of rain during finals, I genuinely believe they were on track for a grand final appearance, if not a flag. Still, their body of work this season was impressive and laid a strong foundation for the future.

The Second XI has always been one of the most challenging sides to manage at Ormond, and this season was no exception. For the past five or six years, it's been a team that often sits at the crossroads of development and depth, and this year was particularly tough due to a number of player departures and constant movement across the grades.

Over the course of the season, no fewer than 27 players rotated through the Second XI a testament to the instability we faced, but also to the depth we were building. It's an incredibly difficult job to keep a side like that competitive,

cohesive, and focused, and I want to acknowledge James Robertshaw for doing a fantastic job as skipper under those circumstances. His leadership and resilience were vital to holding that side together and ensuring they finished the season strong.

The side really evolved into a development team this year, which in many ways was exactly what we needed. We saw promising growth from several of our younger players Pete O'Malley, Leo Gelfand, Leo Glenane, and Sid Bhatnagar, all of whom took major steps forward in their games.

One of the standout highlights of the season was Sid's century an incredible story in itself. He went from being too sick to play, to me calling and, let's be honest, forcing him to bat and then he went out and absolutely belted a brilliant hundred. That kind of grit and determination speaks volumes about him and about the culture we're trying to build.

This side was also a launchpad for our English imports Sean Davies, Amman Broughton, and Charlie Ogrizovic all of whom contributed both on and off the field. We thank them for being part of the club, and we wish them all the best as they head back home.

Now to our First XI, which entered a significant transition phase this season. After last year's grand final appearance, we saw six players from that squad move on half the side which naturally presented some challenges. But with that came an opportunity. For the first time in years, we were able to build and maintain a consistent core group, one we believe can form the backbone of our First XI for the next three to four seasons.

In fact, this season we only used 13 players in the First XI a remarkable stat when you consider that over the past five years, we've averaged a minimum of 15 or more. That kind of consistency gave us the chance to really focus on chemistry, roles, and progression.

We had the debut of Sid Bhatnagar, which was a fantastic moment and one that speaks to the long-term player development we've worked hard on. It also symbolised what this year was about laying a foundation for the future. By season's end, we felt like things were starting to click. There were some great signs of what this group is capable of, and plenty to be excited about going forward.

The late-season performances of Jamie Price were a huge highlight two standout scores of 70+ that reminded us all of his match-winning potential. With runs beginning to flow for others in the back end as well, it felt like momentum was building just as the season concluded.

As always, our bowling group set the tone. Bailey Moon, Rod Bird, and Nick Oaten led the way with their trademark consistency, and our spinners provided balance and pressure throughout. It was especially pleasing to see both Will Robertshaw and Oscar Fraser getting consistent game time in the First XI this year an experience that will only make them stronger heading into next season.

We're genuinely excited about what this group can become. The pieces are starting to fall into place, and if we can keep this squad together and continue to build on the foundations, we've set this season, we believe the future is incredibly bright for our First XI.

As a club, this season has been both challenging and frantic on and off the field but through it all, we've been incredibly fortunate to have had so many amazing people step up into key roles, ensuring Ormond continues to thrive.

First, I want to extend a heartfelt thank you to Darren Seymour, who has stood down as Club President for your years of dedication and service. He hands the reins over to Russell Oaten better known to all of us as Rusty a lifelong

clubman who's been involved in thousands of games, moments, and memories. We couldn't ask for a better person to take the lead, and we're truly excited to see where his leadership will take us next.

A massive shoutout also to our captains across all grades, you've all done a tremendous job, and I'm sure you'll speak to your own teams and journeys later tonight. Your leadership has been vital to everything we've achieved this year.

As a club, we've gone through a lot some great moments, some tough ones but none more exciting than our Fourth XI premiership and the incredible milestone of welcoming our very first women's team to the club. I know Lachy Collopy will speak more to that, but I want to say this: the culture that's been built around that team, and the impact of Beth Beddoe, Lachy, and all the girls, has been nothing short of transformative. It's set our club on a brilliant path for the future.

And what a moment for Eliza Heard our overseas player, who not only made history by becoming the first female to win a Fourth XI premiership in Sub-District cricket but has also played a huge part in uniting the club across both the men's and women's programs. A huge round of applause for her achievement.

We're hopeful that the women's program continues to go from strength to strength with the potential for a second team already being talked about, which I'll leave that to Lachy and Beth to expand on. But from where I stand, it's clear we're heading in the right direction.

I want to thank everyone who helped make this season possible—our committee, our captains, particularly Will Robertshaw, whose tireless work behind the scenes often goes unnoticed. SENIORS REPORT 2024/25

The following is a brief summary of season 2024-25 for each of the senior XIs:-

FIRST XI REPORT 2024/25

SEASON REPORT-

Season 2024/25 was a challenging one for the First XI, finishing 13th overall. While that result wasn't what we set out for, there were still plenty of individual highlights and positives to take forward as we continue to build.

We had a total of 14 players represent the First XI throughout the 2024/25 season. Among them were new faces to the club, including Jamie Price (UK), Amaan Broughton (UK) and Clement Tommy (Vanuatu) - all new to the club and playing the majority of the season. Jackson Hall in his 2nd year at the club, made his debut in round 3 v Hoppers Crossing. We also saw Siddh Bhatnagar (age 15), who after making 100's in the 2XI and junior levels in succession, made his First XI debut against Port Melbourne.

With a new Captain and leadership group, we knew there'd be a period of adjustment - and while we showed glimpses of what we're capable of, we weren't consistent enough when it really counted. That said, the lessons we've taken from this year will hold us in good stead, and the group is committed to bouncing back stronger next season.

From a team perspective, there were a few games that stood out - none more than our gritty defence of 127 away at Werribee in Round 2, a solid all-round performance in the T20 against Spotswood, 5 runs short of winning outright against Melton and finishing strong with three wins from our last four matches, highlighted by a terrific effort against top-of-the-table Oakleigh in Round 15. Also of note was our effort to bat out the day in the 2nd innings v Caulfield, backs were against the wall, and we showed we are capable when we play for each other.

There were some strong individual performances throughout the year. With the bat, Bailey Moon took the honours, winning the batting award with 284 runs at an average of 21.85. His standout innings came in Round 1 with 77 against Malvern and a quick fire 46* in the second innings of Round 12 v Melton where we fell 5 short of the 87 needed from 14 overs to take the 10 points. Other notable knocks include Clement Tommy's 59* against Hoppers Crossing, James Bartholomeusz's contributions included 53 (Round 7), 60* (Round 14), and 56 (Round 15), as well as Zac Sleeman's 63 (Round 6) and 65 (Round 9). Jamie Price was in great touch late in the season with scores of 83 against Melton and 72 against Yarraville. Declan Waddington dug in when we needed him with a well-made 53* to hold off Caulfield in round 14.

With the ball, Rod Bird was outstanding once again and a deserving winner of the bowling award (for the 8th time), claiming 21 wickets at an average of 14.1. He tore through Melton in Round 12 with figures of 3/12 and 4/27 and backed it up with 3/23 in round 15. Other highlights include Miles Sellenger's 3/20 against Werribee where we successfully defended a total of 127, Will Robertshaw's 3/29 v Port Melbourne, Oscar Fraser's 4/54 against Caulfield in Round 14. Nick Oaten's 4/20 in Round 15 against top of the table Oakleigh. On a whole the effort of our bowling group was something we can be proud of, keeping us in majority of games throughout the season, assisted by our superb efforts in the field led by Declan Waddington with the gloves.

While the results didn't go our way, there's still plenty to build on. I'm proud of how the group stuck together and continued to turn up week after week, and I'd like to thank my Vice-captain Zac Sleeman for all of his support and efforts throughout the year - as well as all the players, coaching staff, committee members, and supporters for their ongoing commitment to not only the First XI but the Ormond Cricket Club as a whole. We're better for the experience this season and already looking forward to taking a step forward in 2025/26.

Going in this season our expectations were set high following on from the success the team had the previous season finishing runner up. J.G. CRAIG U15 TURF TEAM 2024/25

SEASON REPORT

Each year the Victorian Sub-District Cricket Association (VSDCA) runs the J.G. Craig Competition for Under 15 cricket players. It is recognised as the premier Under 15 cricket competition in Victoria and is conducted in January each year. All 28 sub-district clubs enter a team.



The competition was known as the R M Hatch Competition for more than 50 years but in 2014/15 it was re-named the J G Craig Competition after Ormond and VSDCA legend, John Craig. John scored more than 7,000 runs in the VSDCA and was part of 6

premierships at Ormond. As such, the club has a special connection with the competition and the club has enjoyed great success in the competition over recent years having won it in 2007/08, 2016/17 and again in 2017/18. We were also runners up in 2008/09 and semi- finalists in 2005/2006, 2006/2007 and 2013/14. The club was also quarter-finalists in 2010/2011 and the 2019/20 season.

We have historically fielded a team that is a combination of the best current Ormond junior under 15 players together with juniors from other metropolitan clubs in the south-eastern suburbs of Melbourne.

We started planning for the competition very early and conducted a winter training programme as part of the talent identification process. This was followed by an extensive trial period where the boys trained extremely hard both at Cricket HQ and at E E Gunn Reserve. By October we were very confident that we had assembled a strong team with very good batting and bowling depth. We had a practice game away against Preston. We produced a sound result, so the signs were positive that we would go deep into the tournament.

Moving into January, we experienced a mixed bag of weather, including rain and some windy conditions. In our Round 1 game against Caulfield, we showed great signs with the ball, with Hugo Thompson taking a hat-trick and helping restrict Caulfield to 6/95 off 37 overs. We attempted to chase the target with 12 overs left in the match, but at 3/32 after 4.3 overs, the rain returned and the match ended in a draw.

In Round 2, we played Elsternwick away and produced a strong batting performance, posting 8/169 off 45 overs, led by Tom Haydon (54) and Luke Hibberd (36). Our bowling attack, dominated by spin, dismissed Elsternwick for 117, with wicket-takers including Shlok Shanbhag (3), Hugo Thompson (3), and Priyam Sharma (2).

Round 3 saw us back at home against the eventual semi-finalists, Oakleigh, on a rain-affected morning, which reduced the game to 38 overs. After being restricted to a modest total of 156 off 37.4 overs, our bowlers once again delivered, holding Oakleigh to 8/135 off their 38 overs. Hugo Thompson was outstanding as he was all tournament, taking three crucial wickets. Beating a side that made the finals showed how up and down our results were—key moments across the season ultimately cost us a chance to compete in the back end of the tournament.

For Round 4, we were away against Malvern. While we initially thought there may be a delay due to overnight rain, we arrived to find a wet pitch. We did everything we could to get the game on, allowing for another 38-over match. Unfortunately, we didn't get the best of the conditions, having to bat first on what could only be described as a poor pitch. We were bowled out for 118, and Malvern made the most of the improving surface, passing us six wickets down in the 32nd over.

We returned to the glorious EE Gunn Reserve for our Round 5 clash against Moorabbin. We bowled first, with pace bowlers Ben Williams and Aarav Verma taking early wickets. From there, Hugo Thompson and Shlok Shanbhag finished the job, restricting Moorabbin to 9/108 off 45 overs. We struggled with the bat, with four players scoring over 16 but none passing 25. Some positive lower-order batting from Hugo Thompson got us over the line at 8/109 off 38 overs. However, our lack of top-order contributions remained a concern.

Round 6 was against Port Melbourne, where we chose to bowl first in an effort to improve our Q score and enhance our finals chances in a strong South group. Our bowling was exceptional, highlighted by Hugo Thompson's incredible 4

for 2 off 9 overs! There were contributions all around from Matt Esposito (2), Aarav Verma (2), Ben Williams (1), and Peter O'Malley (1). Our batting was a show put on by two boys—Peter O'Malley made a stunning 89 (71), well supported by Jack Darley with 41* (80)—successfully boosting our Q score to set up the final match.

Round 7 had us on the road to Brighton, with a win guaranteeing us a finals berth. We won the toss on what looked like a heavily used pitch and chose to bat first to take advantage of the conditions. Again, we had three top-order batters reach 20 or more, but none went on to play a match-winning innings. We finished with 7/166 off 45 overs, leaving the match evenly poised. We struck early through Ben Williams but struggled to break Brighton's second-wicket partnership. Eventually, we broke it and took 5 for 62, but ultimately fell short in what felt like a disappointing result.

The boys gave their absolute all over the nine months we were together. As coach, I was incredibly proud to see the way the boys developed their skills, learnt as much as they could, and had heaps of fun along the way. They all represented the Ormond Cricket Club with pride and distinction and should be extremely proud of how they handled every situation that was presented to them.

To captain Ben Williams—the way you led the side and the dedication you showed towards the club was brilliant. The boys absolutely loved your leadership, and your captaincy was outstanding. Thank you from me and the club for everything you did to make the tournament so enjoyable. Thanks also to vice-captain Hugo Thompson for the support and leadership you provided throughout the tournament and for assisting Ben on and off the field.

To all the parents who helped with scoring, lunches, and driving the boys all over the place—thank you. A special mention must go to Brett Williams, who prepared all the lunches at our home games for the boys.

Finally, to Pat Camm (JG Craig Coordinator), Will Scott (Assistant Coach), and Michael Cove (Specialist Coach)—thank you so much for everything you do for me, the players, and the Ormond Cricket Club. The amount of time you all gave to make this such a fun and enjoyable tournament was deeply appreciated by everyone involved. A special thank you to Pat for allowing us to use his indoor facility, Cricket HQ, to help develop the players and work on their skills. Will is incredibly dedicated to helping the boys and is brilliant at sharing ideas—he's certainly going to be an amazing coach in the future.

Congratulations to all our award winners, as you'll see below. A special mention goes to James Bokor, who was awarded the Steve Ambler Award. This memorial award is dedicated to Steve and is presented to the player who goes above and beyond, shows outstanding commitment, and upholds all the values that Ormond Cricket Club stands for. 

SEASON REPORT



The 2024–25 season marked a period of growth and achievement for our U14B team. For most players, it was their first year competing on a full-length cricket pitch and adapting to the format of Friday evening matches. Notably, Max Skinner and Henri Allen made their club cricket debuts, demonstrating significant development in skill and confidence throughout the season. The team performed consistently well, securing six wins from nine regular season matches and concluding the home-and-away rounds in third position on the ladder. Their hard work, resilience, and team spirit shone through right until the end, falling just short in a tightly contested semi-final against second-placed Brighton.

The season got off to a fantastic start with a strong team performance against McKinnon. Right from the outset, the boys worked together brilliantly, supporting each other with energy and enthusiasm. Our bowlers combined well in partnerships to build pressure, eventually bowling McKinnon out for 81 runs. A special highlight was debutant Max Skinner, who showed great composure to finish with outstanding figures of 3/4 off just two overs. With the bat, teamwork continued to shine as openers Nathan Shaw and Ben Dessent combined for a solid opening stand, setting up a smooth and confident run chase. It was a great reminder early on of the importance of playing as a team, having fun, and backing each other all the way — a theme that carried right through the season.

In our second match, we came up against a formidable Hampton United side—who would go on to claim the premiership—and it proved a true test of character. Our bowlers worked well in partnerships to restrict them to 98 runs from 20 overs, showcasing the discipline and commitment we've been building. Unfortunately, our batters couldn't quite convert starts, and we fell 33 runs short against some tight opposition bowling. While the result wasn't what we hoped for, the boys showed real resilience and composure under pressure, learning valuable lessons about patience and teamwork. Ultimately, the teamwork and positivity we saw in this match exemplified the core values—fun, growth and resilience—that defined every game.

After a solid start, the team built great momentum through Games 3 to 5, with growing confidence and belief. Nathan Shaw led the charge with the bat, notching up two impressive half-centuries in consecutive games — a display of calm, controlled batting that anchored our innings and gave the team real stability at the top. Zach Pirovich also provided dependable support in the opening partnerships, contributing to our solid starts. This period also marked the departure of Ben Dessent after Game 3, who moved away. Ben is a talented cricketer whose all-round capabilities made him one of the stand-out players in the U12A team last season. His departure left a significant gap, but the team showed greater resilience by rallying together and adapting to the new challenges. Game 5 against Brighton was a season highlight. Brighton looked dominant and well-set at the drinks break, but what followed was one of the most memorable turnarounds of the year. Bhavin's brilliant spell of 4/11 triggered a dramatic collapse, backed by disciplined bowling partnerships and sharp fielding, restricting Brighton to just 127 — a total that had looked much larger earlier. It was a terrific example of how belief, teamwork, and pressure can shift the game, and it was moments like this that built the team's confidence heading into the latter half of the season.

As the season wore on, we encountered new challenges- including several players being unavailable due to holidays, which often made it difficult to field a full side. Fortunately, our Under-12s stepped up to help fill the gaps, bringing fresh energy and enthusiasm and making a real difference. Throughout this phase, Nate Dresden stood tall as a leader, guiding the team with calm assurance and setting an example with his attitude and work ethic. Hayden Weiss was ever reliable behind the stumps, bringing great energy and focus as wicketkeeper. Evan Hooda and Massey Keens bowled some tough overs in pressure situations, while Henry Morrissey showed maturity in finishing innings by targeting and removing lower-order batters.

Regardless of the results, the boys continued to back each other, play with heart, and display the kind of spirit that makes cricket enjoyable and rewarding. Qualifying for the semi-finals was a testament to the team's growth and determination. Against a strong Brighton side, the boys prepared well and brought their best effort to the game. Although we couldn't get over the line, it was a performance full of character- with Nate Dresden once again leading from the front, motivating the team with intent and discipline. Every player contributed to the effort, and the pride in

the group was evident both on and off the field. It was a fitting end to a season built on teamwork, resilience, and enjoyment.



SEASON REPORT

Ormond's 12A team comprised 2 players who had played in the 12As the previous year, 4 players from previous years 12Bs and 12Cs, and 5 players joining us from other clubs. After being well beaten in a one-dayer against Mackie/Bentleigh in Rd 1, the team improved steadily and didn't drop another home-and-away game, finishing on top of the ladder. Rain and SECA's decision not to play junior matches on Cup Day and Australia Day weekends meant that we played an inordinate number of one-day matches which are not much good for player development. The semi-final against Mackie/Bentleigh was a wildly fluctuating game. After a quickfire 25 from Finn McKean and good double by Sammy Kavanagh (19 no and 2/3), Ormond had their nose in front 3/86 v 3/75 at end of day 1. However the Mackie bowlers were all over us in the first 10 overs on day 2, and with only a 28 run lead with most of our best batters out, the situation looked hopeless. Young Declan Zaal played a marvelous hand for 26no off 30 balls, and with the help of Elijah Ananth and James Shanahan, another 46 runs were added to post a target of 75 on a slow East Caulfield surface. We went with our top bowlers but Mackie started brightly with 18 runs off the first 3 overs, again the game looked to be slipping away before Pat Hardiman ripped a great yorker through Harman Singh. Another wicket to Pat (3/19) and one to Aarav Vinothkumar in the 26th over had us right back in the game, Mackie 6 down needing 49 to win. Liam Jacques (2/12) struck decisive blows in the 30th over, taking 2 wickets including removing Krotofil cheaply. A runout in the 24th over had retired batter Ved Malu back at the crease with a slim chance to get 33 runs off 36 balls. Elijah Ananth snuffed out that hope when he bowled the No.11 batter to wrap up the game in the 36th over.

We then faced traditional rivals Brighton, who have played off against Ormond in 4 of the past 12A Grand Finals. Brighton won the toss and sent us in, aiming to bat through their innings uninterrupted and set us a run chase in the final 20 overs. Opener Finn McKean batted brilliantly for his 31 ret, and Elijah Ananth made his highest score of the season (14) before being run out in the 20th over. The rest struggled, with Ormond 6/63 at the end of our 20 overs. We bowled tight to keep Brighton down to 1/46 (Sammy Kavanagh 5ov 0/6), a lead of 17 runs with 4 of our better batters still to bat.

Day 2 started OK with Brighton struggling for runs initially against Elijah Ananth (5ov 0/7) and Finn McKean (1/18), who dismissed star bat Damiano for 22 ct behind by Dec Zaal. After 10 overs Brighton had an overall lead of 20 runs, but sadly the last 10 overs were a disaster. Only Mukt Pokharna (4ov 3/14) bowled at the standard required. Needing an improbable 78 to win off 120 balls, we only lasted another 11 overs, all out for 86 runs. Finn McKean (stranded on 38 no) showed real fight and composure, but 9 other players managed only 24 runs between them.





TREASURER'S REPORT 2024/25



Following a profit of \$26,087 in the prior year, the Ormond Cricket Club is reporting a profit of \$6,748 for season 2024-25. The key drivers of the reduction in profit compared to the prior season are a reduction in fundraising activities and some increases in costs across the board. These changes will be explained in more detail below.

It should be noted that both the current and prior year profits are accounted for after a non-cash write-down in the value of equipment on hand of \$3,774 and \$3,500 respectively.

Total income decreased from \$118,309 to \$109,564. The key drivers of this decrease were from a reduction in fundraising activities, predominantly due to the club running less Bunnings BBQs throughout the season compared to the prior season, and from a reduction in donations made by members via the Australian Sports Foundation program. These decreases were partially offset by an increase in membership income due to an increase in junior and senior subs this season, in addition to the introduction of a women's team.

Overall, cricket club expenditure increased in season 2024/25 by \$10,594. This increase was driven by additional coaching and equipment costs due to the introduction of a women's team, the re-introduction of afternoon teas provided by the Club, and increased merchandise purchases.

As a result of the improved financial performance over the last two seasons the Club has built up a more stable cash position and has redirected excess funds to a high interest term deposit facility.

Ormond Cricket Club enjoys a strong ongoing relationship with its sponsors, and the financial contributions of The Door Store, Bendigo Bank East Malvern, Buxton Real Estate, The Bentleigh Social and Advanced Urology Melbourne deserve to be highlighted. The Club also wishes to thank those very generous people and businesses who sponsored a player or made a donation via the ASF during the season.

I would like to acknowledge the support of John Craig and Mathew Cousins in administering the Club's financial matters, as well as thank Will Robertshaw and Darren Seymour for their hard work to drive the prompt payments from players for subscriptions, match fees and merchandise purchases.

Ormond Cricket Club looks forward to continuing its financial momentum in season 2025/26, capitalising on the hard work and discipline displayed over the past two years
